5000 pipes, 72 stops, 3 keyboards. Created by Kuhn Organ Builders, the Abbey of Saint-Maurice's Great Organ is a magnificent story of shared daring and generosity.

It all started in March 1942. A boulder fell from the cliff, destroying the bell tower and organ of Saint-Maurice's basilica. So, our stones and hearts could continue resonating, the canons quickly obtained a modest harmonium, which they bought at a hospital.

In 1945, when the war had just ended and financial burdens were considerable, the canons, attached to their Abbey's musical tradition, started to investigate the possibility of building a church organ with around thirty stops. Céline Bugnion-Lagouarde shared this vision, which was a daring one in the context of the post-war difficulties. She decided to dedicate a part of her fortune to provide the basilica with an organ of excellence, both for liturgy and concerts. It would take two years to draw up the plans.

CÉLINE BUGNION LAGOUARDE



Born in Biarritz in 1873, Céline Bugnion-Lagouarde lived in Aix-en-Provence and then in Lausanne, where she liked to organise musical and literary meetings. Eminently cultured, this «photographer and brilliant pianist*» immortalised figures such as Maurice Ravel.

She regularly came to Saint-Maurice, and her gift of 70,000 Francs changed the history of the basilica's organs.

For 70 years, the Abbey of Saint-Maurice's Great Organ has brought together people, eras and repertoires. It is one of the last remaining organs of this period in French-speaking Switzerland and is in need of major work.

Canons, patrons, organ builders... Inspired by their love of music, their generosity, and their knowhow, contributed to making the Abbey of Saint-Maurice's Great Organ what it is today: an instrument of rare excellence, mixing 19th-century French organ craftsmanship tradition with classical elements. Its infinite possibilities and its incomparable musical brilliance have attracted organists from all over the world, and made demanding works resonate. Throughout the years, the quality of the organ has deteriorated. In order to revive it and let it spread outside its walls, the Abbey of Saint-Maurice Foundation is launching a vast fundraising campaign in 2021.

When an organ pipe resonates and offers a sound to the ear, it is said to speak... The song of the organ, an instrument essential to the Western Christian life of worship, is thus a prayer, uniting with the primordial music of the angels and translating it musically into the language of men. And these words, rising under the vault of churches and cathedrals, transcend the space in which they resonate, becoming praise that rises to the heart of God.

LET THE MUSIC SOUND FOR OUR GOD, LET IT SOUND, LET THE MUSIC SOUND FOR OUR KING, LET IT SOUND (Ps 46: 7)

Yes, the organ has an essential spiritual dimension, because its music does not impose itself onto the song, but, on the contrary, decorates it and what is more, turns it into prayer. We know the ascending movement of prayer, rising from earth to heaven; we are therefore admiring before an organ case so authentically aesthetic, our gaze fixed on the pipes rising up under the church vault, so that the evocative sounds reach the vault of heaven itself.

Yes, the organ prays with the prayer of our words, and at the same time gives birth to a pure music that reveals its full artistic dimension. Art then blends into Beauty, the primary beauty of God as well as the secondary beauty of the musical works created. Thus the world will receive a message of beauty, peace and love when it listens to this organ. For the Abbey, as for all lovers of such resounding majesty, the sound of its music will be a source of life and happiness.

CREATING A

MUSICAL REVIVAL

THOMAS KIENTZ, Titular organist of the Basilica organs

«The restoration project will allow us to pass on our heritage and to create a musical revival. We will be able to discover new timbres that aren't there currently. Two new keyboards will allow us to expand the sound palette with solo stops such as the English Horn, the double flute, and other stops. This will open the organ up to a contemporary repertoire and I will be able to search for a new vocabulary as a composer. Finally, the instrument will also be equipped with new technologies, including a mobile console, which will allow people to view the organist playing, as in a concert hall. This console will be furnished with computer tools that will also allow us to record the organ and have it played without an organist.»



The work of refurbishing, enlarging and integrating the organ in the heart of the basilica will give it a new musical and acoustic dimension, to place it at the heart of contemporary creation.

+ Refurbishing the organ, to pass on its heritage


Kuhn Organ Builders will be responsible for dismantling the organ, then cleaning and treating it, bringing it up to standard, repairing or replacing each of the parts (pipes, wind chests, felts, bellows, electromechanical components...), then reassembling, adjusting, tuning and reharmonising the instrument. It will take six months for the organ to regain its functionality, timbre and power and thus ensure that this historical monument can be passed on to future generations.

+ Enlarging the organ, to give it a new lease on life

The addition of a solo rank of 644 pipes with their swell boxes, controlled by a console with five keyboards, will give the Great Organ an exceptional harmonic richness and acoustic power. Coupling with the chancel organ will create a stereo effect that will allow increased sound richness and spacialisation and will also allow the organ to accompany singing without drowning out the voices. The addition of a 5-keyboard mobile console, which will allow people to see the organist playing, will make the Saint-Maurice Organs a rare and unique set of instruments, suitable both for liturgy and concerts, and open to a resolutely modern repertoire.

+ Uniting the organ and the basilica, to reveal their brilliance

Adjustments will take place in the basilica, where the organ is housed. The gallery will be adjusted and a humidification system will guarantee the longevity and smooth running of the instrument. The acoustics, fixed sound and lighting will be redesigned. The organ, refurbished and enlarged, will surround everyone who visits the Abbey with the richness of its sounds. A high-performance sound and image recording equipment combined with ambitious means of communication will also allow the organ to be heard and seen outside the walls of the Abbey.





Once the organ is refurbished, enlarged and integrated into the basilica, the Abbey of Saint-Maurice aims to become the Centre of Musical Excellence for the Organ, to create a new resonance in and for our society.

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The organ, a majestic art object, is the fruit of 2000 years of acoustic innovation. A bridge between the world of prayer and the outside world, it stirs all emotions, touches all hearts with the infinite palette of its colourful sounds. In the most beautiful of languages, music, it speaks to the person of yesterday, today and tomorrow, to show us a vision of a world where excellence, beauty, faith, commitment and brotherhood all have their place. The Abbey of Saint-Maurice's Centre of Musical Excellence will aim to bring people together around the organ, to pass on to them this essential element, so necessary for our world which has lost its bearings.

«At the forefront of tradition»


Founded over 1500 years ago, our Abbey thinks of its history, its present and its future, as gifts from God. Humble and fragile, it received at its founding the mission of praising God day and night on the tomb of Saint Maurice and his companions. No doubt the singing of Psalms was accompanied by musical instruments from the beginning. The archives reveal the presence of an organ in our basilica from its inauguration in 1642. After a fire, a new instrument appeared in 1727. An expansion of the church allowed a Carlen organ to be acquired in 1891. The fall of the bell tower in 1942 gave rise to the need to build our Kuhn organ. Today the wear and tear of time necessitates a complete refurbishment and the creation of an organ for the 21st century. Since nothing is too expensive for the service of God, on each occasion the Abbey has boldly dedicated considerable amounts of money, helped by wonderful acts of generosity.

At the forefront of tradition, the Abbey community thanks all the donors who will allow the Abbey to continue its mission of divine praise at the heart of the 21st century world.






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
- 1 General refurbishment of the instrument: 500'000 CHF
- Addition of an expressive Solo keyboard and addition of a new fixed console with 5 keyboards: **710'000 CHF**



Electrification and integration of the chancel organ: 60'000 CHF

INTEGRATION WORK & MISCELLANEOUS: 480'000 CHF

- Carpentry & painting (gallery, walls): 50'000 CHF
- Sound (acoustics, sound recording, audiovisual equipment): 70'000 CHF
- Lighting (fixed and mobile): 170'000 CHF
- Humidity and temperature control: 30'000 CHF
- Electricity, wiring & safety systems: 40'000 CHF
- General work (handling, scaffolding): **30'000 CHF**

22ND SEPTEMBER 2022

Last use of the current organ for the Feast of Saint Maurice.

OCTOBER 2022

Installation of scaffolding, hoisting machinery and near-complete dismantling of the organ.

NOVEMBER 2022

Start of integration work

(modifications to the gallery, wiring, acoustics, fixed lighting, purchasing of equipment).

END OF JANUARY 2023

Progressive reassembly of the organ, addition of the 644 pipes of the solo keyboard, installation of the solo's swell box, installation of the new 5-keyboard fixed console in the gallery.

MARCH 2023

Delivery of the new 5-keyboard mobile console, connections, first tests.

11TH APRIL 2023 (EASTER MONDAY)

Last use of the chancel organ before the installation of the remote control console and tuning.

APRIL & MAY 2023

Organ harmonisation and tuning, various finishing touches, disassemblies, general cleaning.

28TH MAY 2023

Feast of Pentecost, blessing and inauguration of the Great Organ. An inaugural evening concert will follow.
